- Taking the time for both broad and deep engagement




Our shared purpose*

- Think about direction, then function
- Make this part of current work, not an add on
- Take ownership of goals
- Accept failure, try new things
- Be thankful for gifts in life
- Take care of the life given to us
- Live as if we are interconnected

Must Not Dos

- Do not exert hierarchies
- Don't give up

Developing our shared criteria


Shared criteria help us to...

Q2 At our August 8 workshop, we discussed but did not decide on 5 other criteria. Please rate the 5 criteria we discussed:


There is an urgency to the issue




It meets a Tribal Council priority




It will save us money in the long run

Shared Criteria

At our October 17, 2018 workshop, we selected the following criteria:



- There are influential champions
- If we are successful, it will impact other areas we care about
- We can each find a role to play in advancing the effort
- It is focused on upstream, root causes
- It creates a positive future for our people
- It has the potential to have a high impact
- It will lead to people discovering new ways of wellbeing and becoming less dependent on government services

Potential priorities: Our norms



At our October 17, 2018 workshop, we developed the following norms – whatever priority we choose will seek to:

- Be trauma informed
- Be developed in a way that supports our cultural identity
- Heal divisions within our tribes
- Have a multi-generational approach
- Have defined, realistic methods and measures for assessing the outcomes

Potential priorities

Potential priorities were developed during the January & August workshops. At the October 17, 2018 meeting, we narrowed the priorities to the following options:

- **Sexual assault & incest prevention**
(Ex: Every person seeking support gets it)
- **Two Eagle River School**
(Ex: Improve outcomes for students)
- **Teen parents/new parents**
(Ex: Improve parenting skills, increase housing, provide wraparound support)
- **Food sovereignty/food security**
(Ex: Increase access to healthy foods)
- **Substance Abuse prevention**
(Ex: Increase coordination with existing efforts)

At our next meeting, we will...

- Select a priority issue
- Discuss structure moving forward
